The course has been around for decades, previously called The American Legion Institute Course, then revised around 2013 with several updates now called The American Legion Basic Training Course. The original idea rather than have just have one course the basic training course is to have three phases: Basic, Mediate and Advance training course.

Once you complete the course, you will be provided the opportunity to print off a certificate of completion. Post 2000 sees the value in this and with proof of completion for the year 2021, the commander will present you with a graduation pin. There

are very few earned pins in the American Legion, and this is one of them. This course is not just for Legion members. SAL members and Auxiliary members can take the course as well. The American Legion Basic training course will take you on a journey of the American Legion Family, traditions, and duties of the officers. It will guide you through history of the American Legion & its accomplishments. Introduce you to the many programs within the American Legion. The Course provides you with both video clips and lecture. Speeches in history. It is divided into 6 sections each with their own quiz at the end. This can be completed in 2-3 hours, or if you desire a few weeks, the best part is you can't fail because it provides you second chances to find the correct answer. It is strongly suggested and encouraged for any one person taking any position of office to take the course. This is also a steppingstone to greater things ahead as an officer in the American Legion.
